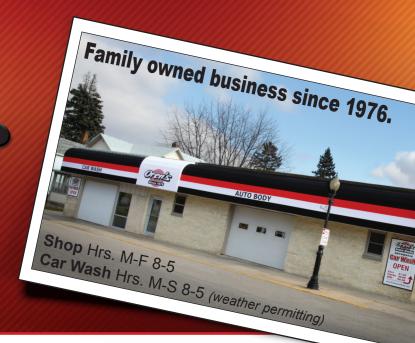

Quality You Expect...

Warm Your Toes and the Tip of Your Nose!

Can you imagine jumping in your vehicle in the morning on a cold winter day and not have heat on your way to work? It certainly wouldn't be a good start to the day. How fortunate we all are to have warm vehicles. Some are even fortunate enough to have heated seats and/or steering wheels! Think about those days of horse and buggy....brrrrr!!

When cars were first invented, rides in them could be downright chilly, especially during winter months. After all, these early-model vehicles were open bodied, so wind, rain and snow could whip around drivers and passengers. Glass windshields started to appear around 1907, breaking some of the wind, and motorists bundled up and put gas lamps in their cars to create some radiated heat. But, still! It was cold.

At the 13th National Automobile Show in New York, a mass production car debuted that was fully enclosed: the Hudson "Twenty," which was produced in Detroit, starting on July 3, 1909. Because this car was a warmer ride, 4,000 vehicles sold that year – this in spite of the cost of nearly \$1,000 (about \$26,000 in today's dollars; remember that car financing wasn't typically available to buyers). In 1910, Hudson built nearly 6,500 of these cars to continue to meet demand and, by 1925, Hudson was the third largest US car manufacturer behind Ford and Chevrolet.

Although an enclosed car was warmer than an open-bodied, traveling was still a cold proposition in the winter. People tried to recycle exhaust fumes into their vehicles to benefit from small amounts of interior heat. This doesn't sound like a particularly safe idea, though, and it couldn't have smelled great, either. In 1929, a hot air heater was available in the Ford Model A. It took a while to fire up and it provided inconsistent engine-generated heat, but it had to be safer than inhaling exhaust fumes. In 1933, Ford installed the first in-dash heating unit: gas powered.

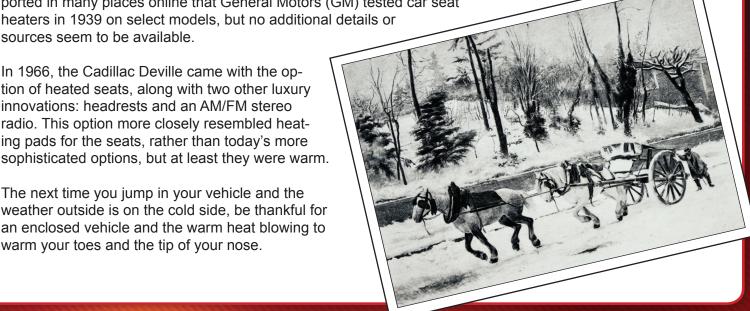
Meanwhile, General Motors created a heater that used redirected engine coolant, debuting the first modern heater core in 1930. Although improvements are continually being made in the auto world, this 1930 model is still the basis of what's being used today.

Although car heaters made driving far more comfortable, a heated seat would provide targeted heat to one particular body part – and that was an appealing idea to many. It's reported in many places online that General Motors (GM) tested car seat

sources seem to be available.

In 1966, the Cadillac Deville came with the option of heated seats, along with two other luxury innovations: headrests and an AM/FM stereo radio. This option more closely resembled heating pads for the seats, rather than today's more sophisticated options, but at least they were warm.

The next time you jump in your vehicle and the weather outside is on the cold side, be thankful for an enclosed vehicle and the warm heat blowing to warm your toes and the tip of your nose.

Slow-Cooker Zucchini Soup

- 1 T. olive oil (put in skillet to prevent sausage from sticking while browning)
- 1 lb. sweet Italian sausage
- 2 c. chopped celery (about 6 stalks)
- 2 lbs cut zucchini into about ½ inch slices (8 cups)
- 2 28 oz. cans untrained diced tomatoes
- 2 cut into strips or diced peppers of your color choice
- 1 c. chopped onion ½ tsp. garlic powder
- 1 tsp. salt 1 tsp. Italian seasoning
- 1 tsp. sugar 1 tsp. dried basil
- 1 tsp. dried oregano
- 6 T. grated parmesan cheese, or to taste

(I used $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ cup)

Heat olive oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat until hot. Add sausage and cook, stirring and breaking up lumps until browned and crumbly, 8 to 10 minutes. Pour off grease. Add celery to sausage in skillet and cook, stirring occasionally, until celery is softened, about 10 minutes. Transfer sausage mixture to a slow cooker. Stir in zucchini, tomatoes (with juice), peppers, onion, salt, sugar, oregano, Italian seasoning, basil, and garlic powder. Cook, covered on low until zucchini is tender, about 6 hours.





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
